## CCCMHB Receives Outstanding Board of the Year Award from NAMI Ohio

CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO -- The National Alliance on Mental Illness of Ohio (NAMI Ohio), the country's largest state mental health advocacy organization, recently presented the Cuyahoga County Community Mental Health Board (CCCMHB) with the 2006 Board of the Year Award.

The CCCMHB was recognized for the commitment to the citizens whose lives have been impacted by mental illness. According to Terry Russell, Executive Director of NAMI Ohio, no behavioral health board in the state of Ohio has embraced the family and consumer movement more than the CCCMHB.
