## LIBRARY CARDS & INTERNET RESOURCES

Getting a FREE library card will enable you to use the services and resources of the Public Library systems at neighborhood branches throughout Cuyahoga County. The library can be a very valuable resource of information, recreation and enrichment. The Public Library systems work together to provide a wide range of information materials as well as programs for pre-school and school-age children. These include:

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In addition, most local libraries provide computer access free of charge.
